We hope you can join us to celebrate the achievements of the Band over the past year.



Brass bands from across the Isle of Man are joining together for what promises to be a spectacular evening of brass music at the Villa Marina on Sunday 16th August, supported by Zurich International.

Members of Castletown Metropolitan Silver, Douglas Town, Manx Concert Brass, Manx Youth, Onchan Silver, Rushen Silver and Ramsey Town Bands will combine to create a band of in the region of 100 – 120 players, presenting a programme of a wide range of music from all genres, with conductors from across the Bands taking the baton.

The event's organiser, Chris Weldon (Chairman of Rushen Silver Band) explains:

"The lockdown period was hard for everyone – it restricted everything we all do – so this is a great chance for the community to come together, play and hear some live music and celebrate the success we have had over COVID19. Music is a way make people feel good and this concert gives us a chance to all share the experience together. It is a chance to say thank you to our health service staff and raise some money for a well-known and respected local charity, the Friends of Noble's Hospital in recognition of the work of the Island's health services. 
Fundraising Concert for MCH

Lockdown and the challenge of a xylophone duet....

Ellie Matthews and Ian Bell recently rose to prominence via an article on the Culture Vannin Facebook page during lockdown about their efforts at a xylophone duet. From that, we decided to find out a bit more about their backgrounds.

What brought you into the world of music and brass bands in particular?

Ellie: When I was 15 years old, all my family were out on Monday nights, including my Dad and sister who were already in the Band at the time. Once John Kinley found out I was sitting around with nothing to do (except watching multiple episodes of Father Ted), he invited me to play percussion.

Ian: My older brother and sister were already in the Band by the time I joined so I obviously decided to fall in line and do my duty. I started on the cornet and still play the cornet.

Who do you believe you got your musical talents from?

Ellie: Talent is a generous word. Thank you. Most of my family are involved in music in some way or other. My sister, Hazel, who played Cornet in the Band is far more musically talented than I am. However, if you ask where I got the ability to hit things in time from – Jill Collings certainly helped me as she taught me the piano from an early age.

Ian: My mum played the violin and sang with the Youth Choir so I guess I may have got some inspiration there. I also sang and played piano before joining the Band and all my siblings have played in brass bands.



What do you enjoy about Band?

Ellie: I absolutely love the music and the challenge of learning something new. There are so many different percussion instruments to learn and it's so much fun being introduced to a new one. This year saw me play the drum kit in a concert for the very first time. I never had the opportunity to do this before because the Band had very good drummers previously. Now I have a drum kit at home so be prepared for more Ellie on drums! I also can't fail to mention how nice the people are of course. The diversity of the characters makes the group more interesting and fun to be part of. I like the fact that everyone is welcome and there is no room for musical snobbery.

Ian: The best thing about the Band is what it does for the community. I enjoy being out and about providing entertainment and raising money for people in need across the south of the Island. Carolling at Christmas is fun because of the atmosphere and the generosity of the people.

Do you have any particular favourite types of music?

Ellie: I particularly enjoy the pieces we play for the Richard Evans weekends simply because they are challenging. Away from the world of brass bands I enjoy listening to all sorts; rap, country, pop – anything! I'm a bit obsessed with a folk/pop band from the Highlands of Scotland called Tide Lines. In fact, they were playing in



Lorient at the same time as Rushen in 2017. Hazel and I recently featured in one of their music videos (for about 3 seconds!).

Ian: Anything with a good tune, even if I can't play it!

What are your earliest Band memories?

Ian: My earliest Band memory is sitting at the Royal Hotel watching my brother and sister play. The guest performances were 'Renditions of Kathleen Faragher' and Jack and Peggy playing the saw. Because there was a bar at the hotel, many Band members had pints which they were drinking between pieces. How times have changed!

Ellie: I do remember meeting Richard Evans for the first time a fair while ago. His first words to me were: 'I like you' (in a strong Lancashire accent). I also remember one of my first concerts being with Meadowside Choral Society at Christmas. One of the ladies in the choir told me they liked watching me run around at the back of the Band. I was probably trying to play three parts at once.

How did you cope in lockdown without Band?

Ellie: During the weeks of lockdown, Ian and I learnt a xylophone duet. He bought me an Adams Soloist Xylophone for my birthday – I understand that may sound like a strange present. However, we've had a lot of fun learning and we can nearly go at the same speed as HM Royal Marines without too many mistakes after two weeks' practice.

The Band are pleased to be taking part in the 2020 Prash Laxaa which will be held on the revised date of Sunday 30th August as the original date in early May was during the lockdown period.

For the event, there will be six sessions at 30minute intervals starting at 1pm. Each of the bands will perform three
